PLANNING SUPPORT FOR SCHOOL RESOURCE SELECTION



Story Box Library (SBL) is a resource that is enjoyed nationally and internationally by teachers, students and families, but generating support to ensure resources are allocated is often a hurdle.

PLANNING CHECKLIST

- ✓ Familiarise yourself with the features and functions of SBL.
- Prepare to take your colleagues and leadership team on a tour of the site to showcase features of SBL and benefits for your school.
- Invite individuals and teams of teachers to experiment with SBL and report back to whole staff or other teaching teams.
- Provide viewer log-in details to the school community, inviting teachers, students and families to explore SBL during the trial period and request formal or informal feedback.
- Prepare responses to questions you will likely be asked by the leadership team regarding audience, purpose and implementation of SBL as a new school resource (We've provided a planning guide to assist).
- Provide clear examples of how SBL will and can be used, such as preparing an action plan or a sample teaching and learning sequence.
- Collate and share feedback from other colleagues, students and families during trial process.
- Print and share the subscription quote supplied by SBL.
 - If your proposal is rejected, consider fundraising options.

TEACHER AND STUDENT SUPPORT MATERIAL

Classroom ideas:

We've created a 'pick-and-mix' for teachers; an abundant list of engaging discussion questions and activities to further explore the stories in our library, which are rich in content and textural features. You have licence to choose, combine, adapt, simplify or extend our ideas to tailor teaching and learning activities to the abilities and needs of students.

Our Classroom ideas can be used in the teaching and learning of English- particularly in the areas of receptive language modes, literacy and literature- but also to develop General Capabilities, Cross-Curriculum priorities and knowledge and skills in other Learning Areas of the Australian Curriculum.

Our ideas are diverse, providing opportunities for children to listen to, view, speak, write, create, reflect and compare texts within our library while also developing other skills such as metacognition, social skills, and critical and creative thinking.

Download, print or use Classroom Ideas electronically. You'll also find links to other relevant stories and additional resources.

Student task sheets and QR codes:

Kids view and respond to stories independently with our Student Task Sheets. Each Task Sheet includes a QR code, to directly access the story, and three text response task options, each with a different focus and level of complexity.

Allow your students to select tasks for choice and autonomy in learning, or differentiate learning by assigning tasks to students based on how they best process content.

Activity time:

Engage and involve parents and families in learning with our Activity Time—a great holistic alternative to homework sheets.

Children and parents access an Activity Time PDF for each story with their at home access. Collectively, they provide a variety of developmentally appropriate experiences for students to enjoy with their family, promoting a balanced, connected, playful and creative approach to learning, while helping students to comprehend and respond to texts.



TIME-SAVING ACCESSIBILITY AND LEARNING SUPPORT TOOLS

Closed captions:

Our closed captions help teachers support students with additional learning needs. By enabling via your Account Settings page, this visual support tool allows students to follow along with the story. It's particularly useful for students who have a hearing impairment or who speak English as an Additional Language. Combining audio and visual elements can also help students with SLD's -such as Dyslexia- alleviate difficulties associated with reading, spelling, word recognition, comprehension and focus.

Playlists:

To assist with differentiated teaching, use our playlist feature to curate personalised lists of stories specific to the interests or needs of your class, small learning groups or individual students. Playlists are a handy planning tool for teachers, minimising time spent searching for stories during class time and a backup for when plans go awry.

Search filters:

Our search filters make it faster and easier for you to find the stories you need.

- Our **theme filter** helps you find the right story for the right occasion. For example, find a story to help:
 - Model a particular text structure or language device
 - Model a concept from a learning area other than English
 - Start conversations about topics being studied in your units of work
 - Inspire investigations as part of a STEM program
 - Act as social stories, modelling friendships, social and communication skills, daily life and routines
- With an ever-growing library, **age filter** will help you find the right story for the age of your students. Upper-primary teachers will find this filter particularly useful because picture books aren't just for little kids.
- Our **storyteller filter** helps you find your favorite storyteller's reads. This search filter is great to help find the right storyteller to engage your students or hook a reluctant reader.
- Use **author/illustrator filter** to find stories or short films from authors and illustrators you admire, to complement an author or illustrator study or to support a guest author/illustrator visit your school.
- Our **duration filter** helps to find stories or short films from authors and illustrators to work within your schedule.

Our many features make SBL a tool with multiple applications that allow flexibility of use to meet the diverse and individual needs of your students. With a little creativity, uses of SBL across your classroom, school and students' homes are endless.
